WOT IN TARNATION ABOUT THIS GENTRICATION SITUATION?

Gentrification is typically a problem faced by urban centers, but Pierce City is proof that rural communities face these situations as well. A recent influence of young professionals has led to demographic changes in this traditionally agricultural community. The Federalist Party, in its platform meeting two nights ago, decided to strike up a tone of compromise while siding with the traditional farming section of the community over the newly arriving young and wealthy professionals. The Federalist Party sided with the town's agriculture industry on most issues, but was unwilling to take up the mantle of "party of the farmers" in fear of scaring new arrivals away from the polls.

A key issue in Pierce City politics is what to do about the many undocumented immigrants who work on Pierce's farms. The Federalist Party voted to push for a measure to allow these workers to remain and work in Pierce City, as forcing them to leave could jeopardize the agricultural industry's labor supply. The party also addressed the issue of insurance-less undocumented immigrants who are forced to go to hospital emergency rooms for even the most basic care, as they cannot pay for doctors. The party favored a "prevention" approach by increasing regulation of farm safety to mitigate the problem rather than eliminating it, which was considered to be too much of a strain on the budget.

Standing against one of the most overt symbols of gentrification, the party took a strong stand against the gating of the community, reasoning that gating a rural community would be inefficient and ineffective. Equally strong was the position the party took on the side of gun owners suing a local publication for releasing a map of the many gun owners in the city. The Federalists unanimously agreed with the plaintiffs that the release of this information violated the constitutional privacy rights of legal gun owners who had done nothing wrong. The Federalist Party of Pierce City created a party platform that leans heavily towards the traditional farming segments of the population, but still strives to present itself as a "coalition" between the new class of young professionals and longtime residents. It has yet to be seen whether voters will see the party as a strong coalition, a party of farmers, or a weak organization unable to determine its own base of support.

HONORING THOSE WHO SERVE

On Tuesday night, the Boys State delegation filed into the Yvonne Theater to watch a presentation on one of the most significant invasions throughout the history of war: D-day. The statesmen watched "Turning Point at Normandy: The Soldiers' Story", a very informative movie that recounted the attack on Normandy as well as the events that led up to and followed it. Code named "Operation Overlord", this surprise attack consisted of 85,000 Allied soldiers who were sent to begin the process of reclaiming Europe from Hitler.

The invasion took place onto June 6, 1944, and served as the largest military operation ever attempted. The movie utilized actual pictures and videos from the day of the attack to educate the statesmen about the harsh reality of this brutal attack. Former French resistance members, Allied soldiers, and Nazi fighters also recounted specific war memories to enhance the film's emotional power. D-Day was an exceptionally violent invasion, resulting in 200,000 Allied casualties and 400,000 Nazi casualties.

The movie also shed light on a clever American tactic, which was to convince the German forces that the Allies were going to attack farther up the French coast on the beach of Calais. The American Army, led by General Dwight D. Eisenhower, created a fictitious invasion led by General Patton and placed inflatable vehicles around Northern France to make the false attack appear more convincing.

Upon the film's conclusion, active soldiers and veterans took the stage in front of the statesmen to talk about their careers in the service. Many unique stories were told, offering different perspectives on what time in the armed forces can be like. The soldiers received an enthusiastic standing ovation for the sacrifices they made and the knowledge they shared with the statesmen.

GOVERNOR STRUGGLES EXPLAINED

The morning of Wednesday, June 21st will potentially be the most intense segment of the ALJBS gubernatorial election. All candidates of all counties will have two hours to run (yes, literally run) around campus convincing as many delegates as possible to sign their names to his campaign. Whoever does not have at least 45 signatures by 8:15 am is out of the race. Each delegate may only sign once for their respective party, meaning there will be many candidates left in the dust.

Andrew Fabiano, Nationalist EBO of Jefferson City, has set himself out as an outspoken petitioner for this position. "Responsibility, leadership, and patriotism" are all words Fabiano uses to describe his character. He promotes leadership in daily life by aiding the people of inner city Camden, New Jersey, through local organizations such as "Students for Change" and "Life Camp". These programs focus on service for the betterment of the community, which entails being "in charge of about 100 campers at any given time" who would otherwise "not have meals or a place to go during the summer."

Andrew's primary objective following high school is to join the United States Naval Academy, which demands of its applicants to fill leadership positions. Unquestionably, winning the ALJBS governor's seat would be highly conducive to his acceptance at the Academy. Says Fabiano, "I think it's something I can do, something I do have a shot at."

Andrew stands among many ambitious contenders for one of Boys State's most prestigious positions, all of whom will pose fierce competition. Even still, he remains confident in his ability to lead and can lean soundly against his Nationalist-heavy city.
