TUESDAY'S SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTS

During the various career seminars occurring throughout campus yesterday, one of the most valuable speeches came from two employees of Citizen's Bank. The representatives shared insight into success on Wall Street.

The first part of the seminar was presented by Peter Crivelli, the Principal of Marvin & Palmer Associates, Inc. He spoke of five important characteristics necessary to becoming influential and successful on Wall Street. These included the necessity of communication and teamwork. He emphasized the importance of being able to effectively convince others to proceed with ideas, and to be able to communicate, not just through online resources, but through verbal communication as well. This is one

necessary characteristic which many statesmen have been able to observe throughout the first two days of running the government. It is necessary to use creativity in order to find a "win-win" solution to every situation. Similarly, it is important to have the initiative and to follow through with the proposal. Lastly, in order to become successful on Wall Street, Mr. Crivelli urged that, "you gotta work your butt off and often need to put your personal life aside."

Next, the statesmen heard from David Scordato, the Senior Vice President of Investments of Citizens Bank. He shared with the delegates various pieces of information as to what different careers they can participate in on Wall Street. He explained that most people only ever think about the brokers working on the floor of Wall Street, and do not understand that there are many behind-the-scenes jobs which they may pursue on Wall Street. Some of these include research analysts, corporate finance, and working on the trading desk.

Mr. Scordato then explained the necessity of honesty and ethics while working on Wall Street, and when working in any profession. At the Boys' State program, when filling out petitions, it is necessary for every statesman to be honest when filling them out to make sure that they do not sign more than the allowed number of petitions. It is up to the integrity of every delegate to make sure that he follows these requirements. Integrity starts here, and is truly necessary in the real world in order to show that not every Wall Street exec is Bernie Madoff. When asked by a delegate whether it is ever a hard decision to make the ethical decision over the short term monetary gain, Mr. Scordato gave a blunt reply, "The answer is always no. You must always do what is right for the client."
